QUEENS PARK TO CASH IN ON LOTTERY FUNDING?

This autumn sees Glasgow Land Services Department based in Queens Park keeping their collective fingers crossed while waiting to hear the outcome from an application for Heritage Lottery Funding.

With this much-needed money, work would start immediately on major development works, upgrading the entire park piece by piece. Some schemes will be going ahead, whatever the outcome of the grant – for example, upgrading pavement around the pond over the autumn and winter and designing a massive new rose garden, with the start of planting for the Rose Convention in 2003. Nevertheless, there is no doubt among local residents and park employees alike that a lot more cash is needed to rectify current problems/blackspots and reinstate the park to its former glory.

In future there will have to be major works on the pond, which has developed a large crack in its concrete casement. This, coupled with a particularly dry summer, caused a noticeable lack of liquid!

"Quite simply the water was being lost into the grasslands around the pond or evaporating into the air more quickly than it could be pumped back in" said

Eddie Scanlon, Parks Development Officer. "As soon as we saw some rain, it began to fill up again."

The proposed Lottery funds will also see the implementation of Glasgow-wide park strategies, including new lighting, improved signage and the "bag it, bin it!" scheme for dog waste. In the coming years, Eddie wants to see the boats back on the pond, new amenities and a general restoration of the park. In the meantime, the Land Services Department would like to become more accountable to park users. "If anyone feels there is something they wish to bring to my attention - say, safety aspects or persistent problems - I will be pleased to hear from you...' With our help, (and support from the Heritage Lottery Commission) we can ensure that Queens Park–Strathbungo's Park- remains something we can all be proud of.



Is the Vicky to go?

To the Editor:

Are the people of Strathbungo aware of what Greater Glasgow Health Board are proposing regarding our hospitals?

It is their intention to demolish the Victoria – the Mansionhouse Unit, Cowglen and Leverndale being sold. Acute Services and the Accident and Emergency Department are to be transferred to the Southern General and an ACAD built on the Victoria site. A stand-alone ACAD is not a sensible option – seven miles from the main hospital!

As a member of the South East Forum, along with consultants from the hospitals, I have been working very hard to try and get the people of the South Side a centrally-located state-of-the-art hospital with all the modern technology.

The GGHB, in spite of receiving 3,500 letters from the public saying they wish a new hospital, appear to be trying to ignore public opinion. The Forum would urge people to now write to [the Scottish Health Minister] Susan Deacon MSP at the Scottish Parliament, Edinburgh EH99 1SP airing their views and making it clear that the people require a new hospital and not the proposed piecemeal scheme. Even with a car the Southern General is a fiendish hospital to get to.

Moving heaven and earth ...

Editor's Note: A week before the Midsummer Bungo in the Back Lanes, an unregistered car was apparently abandoned in one main areas that had been designated for the event - much to the dismay of the owners of the private car parking area and also to the Strathbungo Society since they had kindly given us permission to locate a beer tent there. Thankfully, a combined effort finally got it shifted, but not without a monumental struggle - and it raised some serious questions about our rights as property owners, as one of the owners writes ...

... in fact, three different policemen told me that since the car was parked on private property, they could not remove it and that I, personally, would have to resolve the matter, and that was the end of it as far as they were concerned. However, once the Strathbungo Society intervened, and our Community Policeman Constable Masterson was involved, the whole thing was settled, the owner found, and arrangements made to remove the car – all within 24 hours.

I am left with the impression that I, as an individual rate payer, did not

receive anything like the same attention and co-operation from the police as the Strathbungo Society did. Perhaps they have some political clout which I do not.

We put that question to Constable Masterson:

"I suppose it may have looked that way, but really it was just a matter of coincidence and timing. I'd just returned from leave when the Strathbungo Society got involved, but I would have responded just as quickly to Mr Cherry or any individual resident had I been on duty earlier. And then, when I visited, by really good fortune, the lad who owned the car saw us in the lane and came out and took responsibility for it.

To be honest, cars left on private property create a real problem for the police and we are not obliged to act in the same way as we are when a vehicle is abandoned on a public road. But informally, we do everything we can to help out property owners. Certainly I'll try my best to trace the owner on the PNC (Police National Computer), but that doesn't always work – say, if it's been sold at a used car supermarket or whatever. And in that case, it's unfair to property owners, but there's not a lot we can do."
