MOBILE PHONE MAST SET FOR LOCAL AREA?

Concerned local residents gathered at the Fotheringay on 3 April to object to a plan by BT Cellnet to erect a 12 metre mobile phone mast immediately adjacent to the Strathbungo conservation area. Cellnet 's proposed site is on the east side of Darnley Road, just north of Darnley Place. In Strathbungo terms, this is on the opposite side of the railway line from Moray Place, where the second footbridge used to be located, and 12 metres in old money is just under 40 feet.

The current law in Scotland is that the telecomms industry has the right to erect masts under 15m without planning permission under 'permitted development rights' or PDRs, so it is pointless to object to the Council planners.

According to Andrew Downie, who is exploring the issue for the Strathbungo Society,

Cellnet is required to give the Council 28 days written notice and the Council can impose conditions, including those to protect the visual amenity of the locality. 'My impression is that the Council can suggest improvements or alternative locations, within reasonable limits – that is, they can't refuse point blank and are limited in their ability to object, but can put pressure on the operator.'

The Scottish Executive has issued a draft proposal whereby the powers of the public utilities will be made more subject to the control of local authorities, taking into account matters such as their proximity conservation areas (in this case, both Strathbungo and East Pollokshields) and schools (Hutcheson's). However, unless they can meanwhile be persuaded to defer, the mast will be up and operating before a decision is made.

"If Cellnet's 12 March letter to the Council

constitutes an official notice, then we have only until 6 April to register our objections and get the Council to register its own," says Andrew.

Thus the Strathbungo Society is joining Pollokshields Heritage in raising objections directly to BT Cellnet and their contractors Scott Edmondson, while Councillors Walter MacLellan from Strathbungo and Catherine Lyons from Maxwell Park are pursuing the issue at Council level.

You might also want to send a letter of protest, though do be aware of the potential for NIMBYism (Not in My Back Yard). Objections need to be – well, *objective*, to have any hope of influencing the outcome. Consider, for example:

- the need for 'a precautionary approach' until the health risk is known (see the Stewart Report: *Mobile Phones and Health*, published last year by the Independent Expert Group on Mobile Phones, at <u>www.iegmp.org.uk</u>)
- the unsuitability of locating this type of structure bang in the middle of two conservation areas and in sight of a school
- the availability of other more suitable and non-residential sites nearby.

Indeed, the mobile phone mast installed last winter on top of Safeway Crossmyloof is

owned by One-2-One, which raises the question of whether Cellnet might not share this facility instead of erecting its own. There is apparently ample precedent for telecomm companies doing so. Cllr MacLellan says masts also already exist on church spires in Shields Road and Queens Drive and, failing that, the largely industrial area immediately north of the railway bridge at Susie's is also more suitable.

In announcing the closure, Leader of the Council Charles Gordon cited financial pressures and the opening of larger, modern leisure facilities at Gorbals and Bellahouston, saying 'it is a regrettable fact of life that Govanhill Pool is well past its sell-by date.'


On the contrary, many residents across a wide area, including Strathbungo, disagree and have been protesting vociferously for some months now. A petition, organised by the Kingston Swimming Club and Crosshill & Govanhill Community Council, was signed by over 11,000 people. The Save our Pool campaign has since staged a number of events to publicise their cause. And as we went to press, this is one issue that doesn't look like going away, even as the last drops of water go metaphorically down the drain

HISTORIC GOVANHILL POOL CLOSES AMID WIDESPREAD CONTROVERSY

Kevin Kane, chairman of the Strathbungo Society, summarises the issues and action thus far in the grassroots campaign to save the Govanhill Pool from closure.



Strathbungo backs the Save our Pool Campaign

The Strathbungo Society has backed the efforts to save Govanhill Pool from closure, joining a campaign that has generated widespread cross-party support from MPs, MSPs, community and tenants associations, swimming clubs for ethnic minorities and older people - and hundreds of ordinary individuals and families right across the Southside, from Govanhill to Strathbungo, Crosshill, Pollokshields, Langside and beyond.

In response to concerns raised by the Society, Cultural and Leisure Services Convenor Elizabeth Cameron, said that the issue was simply lack of funds: "to refurbish it to comply with... sportscotland's standards would require over £1m." she said.

The lack of effective community consultation and involvement in this decision is a major plank of the campaign's agenda.

The facts speak for themselves. Govanhill's three pools are used to teach 550 people. It is heavily used by older people and by single-sex swim clubs for various ethnic minorities. It has significant levels of GP referrals for use of the pools and steam room. Indeed, David Marshall MP denounced the Council's decision as 'plain wrong', given the vital role that Govanhill Pool plays in the health of his Shettleston residents who have - officially the worst health record of any constituency in the UK!

That was at a march, rally and mass swim on Saturday, 17 March, staged to protest against the Council's decision. Over 400 people heard a variety of speakers urge them to continue supporting the campaign. And continue they do. A candlelit vigil was held on 22 March in Calder Street. Even as the pool closed, supporters were occupying the premises and a Gala day was staged on 31 March. Meanwhile, the campaign is seeking Sportscotland's view in light of their stated strategy for locallybased facilities, especially for excluded groups such as ethnic minorities, older people and special needs groups.

The campaign's demands are straightforward:

- that the Council meet with the local community and user groups to investigate ways of developing the pool, perhaps via a trust
- that a social audit be undertaken to determine the impact of the closure
- and that in the interim - the facility remains open to the communities that use it.

Until this happens, the campaign will continue in its determination to make the Council think again. In the 21st century there must surely be a way to retain and, more importantly, invest in this unique community health and recreational facility.

The view from City Chambers

In a letter dated February 2001 to 'all users of Govanhill Swimming Pool', Leader of the Council Charles Gordon offered what he called 'viable alternatives' for groups who might be disadvantaged by the pool closure – primarily, sessions at the new Bellahouston Leisure Centre and Holyrood School plus possible sessions at Castlemilk (!) and one a week at St Bride's Primary.

Clir Walter MacLellan:

'In the August 1999 Strathbungo News. I advised that the best way for local people to save the pool was to use it. Unfortunately, since then usage has dropped from 125,000 to 80,000 per year and, at the same time, the costs of running the pool and problems with the maintenance of an old building and equipment have increased. The combination of these factors, the undoubted popularity of the Gorbals pool and the pending opening of the new pool in Bellahouston have made the task of local members arguing for its retention impossible.

'The one piece of good news is confirmation of [Charles Gordon's] commitment to local members that the Council will arrange a feasibility study to examine whether any other of the Council's services could move into the existing building or alternative uses be found.

The brief is now being drawn up and will go out to tender following input from the local Councillors and the Govanhill Community Council. This offers an opportunity to look at how the building can be best used by the community and the financial plan to achieve it. While I am sure it will not overcome the disappointment of losing the pool, it is at least something.'

Baillie Elizabeth Cameron:

[20 February letter to MSP Gordon Jackson]

'... I am quite sure that there are ways in which services could be shared or a public/community trust could be put together. Unfortunately, since £700,000 has already been spent over the past five or six years in striving to maintain that building, the Council cannot delay closure whilst work on a feasibility study is being undertaken.' Land Services staff at Queen's Park have not been hibernating during the winter, says Joanna Murphy.

QUEENS PARK ISLANDS Now you see them ...



Queens Park has been awash with activity centring on the pond, complete with two "islands" built of the earth and a motley assortment of crisp bags, Irn Bru bottles etc. left over from dredging it. But - it is "almost positive", say Park staff, that the new islands will now be removed.

It seems that while the mounds were formed to save the £10,000 needed to remove the spoils, there have been many objections to them. Most are safety fears for children - for example, not having a clear view of the water surface should someone get in trouble or kids being tempted to go island hopping. Neither are members of the local model boat club happy with yet another large pond being scaled down in size, as happened at Maxwell Park.

Parks Development Officer Eddie Scanlon, based at the Land Services office near the glasshouses, is now faced with removing the offending structures. "We want to get the pond project right the first time," he says, "which is why we are concentrating on the antiquated drainage which causes the localised flooding in rainy weather.

We are also removing a number of trees which have literally drowned due to the marshy conditions that have prevailed recently near the Balvicar Street entrance '

Once the sides of the pond are relined, which will be done as soon as the risk of frost has passed, the pond will be refilled with water and this summer should see reintroduction of the boats. Queens Park staff are investigating the possibility of a franchise arrangement (contact Eddie on 649 0331 if you're interested). Add to that new benches and bins, improved lighting and - in the longer term - possible relocation of the toddler play area to the open grass space at the foot of the hill – and it looks like the pond is set to return to its former glory as a focal point of the local community



Due to the foot and mouth outbreak, it is unlikely that farmyard animals will be making an appearance at this year's Easter Event at the glasshouses. We are assured that there will be many other activities for kids over the holiday period - see posters in the glasshouses. Also, for the duration of the crisis, Pollok Country Park has transferred their Ranger services to Queens Park. Ring 632 9299 for a brochure detailing events.

Back lanes project marches on

The Strathbungo Back Lanes Group met with Cllr Walter MacLellan on 15 March to present him with a dossier of progress to date in developing a pilot project in the lane at the rear of Moray Place between Queen Square and Marywood Square.

It outlines the interest of residents in the project, the planning permission, technical drawings and "broad brush" costing for the scheme.

The key issue for residents is to know what the maximum cost to them will be, as well as what other sources of funding may be available. To this end, the Society has asked Cllr MacLellan to enquire whether the Land Services Department can provide technical services to allow them to move to a full tender for the job. In addition, the Society is seeking funding from a variety of sources, including the Government's new landfill tax scheme. It's important that the pilot is a success and all efforts are directed to do this, according to Stephen Lamb, who chairs the sub-group.



Squaring the circle in Strathbungo

One Strathbungo landmark (though hardly a cherished one) has disappeared and a new one is about rise in its place to round off the corner at March Street/Nithsdale Drive – more than a century since the rest of the block was completed.

At long last, the 'temporary' quonset hut which has for decades housed the Southern Grinding Centre is gone and work is getting underway on a new Scottish Housing Association development.

City planners insisted on slight modifications to the design of the new building (featured in the June 2000 *Strathbungo News*) to be more in keeping with the Victorian block, which includes Robert Turnbull's magnificent 1878 "round" tenement. According to SHA Director Patrick McGrath, the mainstream housing develop-ment will be a mixture of family and individual flats, plus one small community care flat to house people with learning difficulties and support staff. The Robinson and Davidson contract will get underway as soon as the site is stabilised and Patrick hopes to see the new residents in by Christmas.

"The Council is looking for interest in the derelict church in Pollokshaws Road (opposite Kelley's Bar) and we are wondering if anybody in Strathbungo could suggest possible uses for that building which we might put forward as a community proposal."

Professor Mary Marshall praised the innovative approach to design that improves everyday life for people with dementia at the formal opening on 14 March of a new customised extension at Crossmyloof Resource Centre in Titwood Road. The project was one of four funded by 'Just Another Disability – Making Design Dementia Friendly', a multi-agency initiative that got underway during the Glasgow 1999 City of Architecture & Design celebrations.

EDITORIAL: Swan Song?

A few weeks ago, when we started collecting stories for this issue, I was chatting with our man at Queens Park Eddie Scanlon and asked him, as you do, what happened to the local wildlife when they drained the pond. The fish, he assured me, were 'relocated' to Maxwell Park and will be returned later when the pond is refilled (although how they will know which fish are *ours* is another matter ...). But birds transport themselves and did so naturally as the water dropped.

That is, until a new family of swans arrived. Now swans need a long stretch of water for taking off and these landed up to their webbed toes in mud. The adults knew enough to use the hillside as a runway, but the youngsters hadn't a clue - thus it fell to Eddie and his team to rescue them and release them at Richmond Pond near Shawfield. One can only imagine the squawking on that drive across town, but I thought this was a charming story. I reckoned a lot of people in our little enclave off Queens Park might also like to know that our fishes and fowls were being looked after so well. After all, you may not know every person in Strathbungo, but we all talk about our park, our pond, our fish, our swans our community.

It's been seven years since the new Strathbungo Society replaced the old, lapsed Conservation Society and those of us who were there at the re-birth were keen to stretch beyond the original boundaries in more ways than one. As we suspected, there's quite a lively community here. Over the years, we've had red hot celidhs and the coldest Caribbean night in living memory. We've come within a dozen or so signatures of pulling in hundreds of thousands of pounds for a huge back lanes project, proving how important every individual is in a community of this size. As you see in this newsletter, we're always willing to champion causes that concern our residents. And we have also been able to discuss local services with Council officials, not just as individuals but as representatives of a cross-section of taxpayers.

Along the way, we've established the word *Bungo* as a noun, verb and adjective – not to mention a unit of currency in our LETS scheme. We've bungoed in the park, in the back lanes, at Hallowe'en, at the Bells – and we've tried to make it all seem fun so that the pleasure and pride we hope you feel about living here doesn't get lost in that earnest subtext of *community*. So where do we go from here?

We need help. Not just to attend events, but to help organise them. Not just to moan about rubbish and satellite dishes, but to liaise with Council departments and keep on top of problems. And, most importantly [to me, at least] to form an editorial team to put this newsletter out on a regular basis. Look below and you'll find the names and contact details for all the sub-groups in the committee. Hate meetings? Then pick your area of interest and let the convenor do the meetings for you – it's your ideas and enthusiasm we want.
