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TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT: HAVE YOUR SAY

Shortly after publication of our last issue, representatives from the Strathbungo Society met with Robert Booth, director of Land Services for Glasgow City Council to discuss the area's traffic management problem.

"What we have sought to do is to provide our view of traffic and access issues that the neighbourhood faces and communicate these to the Department," said Strathbungo Society chairman, Kevin Kane.

The aim is to consult with the wider community, possibly by way of a public meeting organised by the Strathbungo Society, to come to an agreed view of any works that may be required. Nothing is planned before the start of the next financial year but we'd love to hear your views. You can contact us directly, via the website or telephone. Alternatively, simply fill in the tick boxes below to indicate whether you support each proposal.

Discussion also touched on emergency access and recycling difficulties. We received a very positive response to our back lanes pilot proposal and hope to bring more news on that in our annual AGM.

We're keen that, as a community, we do the best we can to improve the situation for ourselves. With this in mind, please see our article regarding hedges and garden maintenance. If all the residents of Strathbungo took the time to manage overgrown hedges we could make a vast improvement to pedestrian access on the narrow pavements in the Squares. Finally, the Society has been mindful throughout that it cannot be the sole representatives of the community. We need to know what you think. Please don't feel restricted to the answers suggested below. You might have better, more radical proposals. One resident has written up a radical idea for wholesale restructuring of some local streets to aid emergency vehicle access in this issue. Do you like it or loathe it?

Painted bays at Nithsdale Road

Problems at the junction of Nithsdale Road / Nithsdale Street and back lanes

Residents have complained that 1 Moray Place, Samuel Dows and environs suffers from fly parking, loading and high traffic from the Back Lanes into Nithsdale Road. Double yellow lines or similar clear road markings are required here

A WAY FORWARD FOR FIREFIGHTING?

Over the last few years and most recently at Christmas, fire crews have had difficulty in accessing Strathbungo. Luckily, these fires were minor and were able to be extinguished using hand-held equipment. However, the fire brigade have highlighted that they are unable to guarantee access for major fires. The City Council are looking for us as a community to agree a strategy that allows fire access while minimising the reduction in parking spaces.

These sketches highlight the existing conditions in Marywood Sq and Regent Park Sq, demonstrating that there is just enough room for cars and vans but reduced access for wider vehicles and fire engines. There is no easy solution to these problems, but two options are outlined which will address fire engine access, while minimising the reduction in parking spaces. The temporary option that could be adopted instantly, and at little cost, would entail one side of each street to start parking on the pavement. This would increase the road width to approx 3.5m


which would then allow access. This option would mean losing 12-14 of the 80 or so spaces per street and restricting pedestrian access. Parking bays could be painted on the street to ensure cars are parked efficiently.

A longer-term solution would require the square's roads to be widened by 1.6-2.2m. As well as being costly and disruptive, a 1m wide (3ft) strip of land would have to be given by all households to create a new footpath

This option however has a number of advantages:

- It provides 3.5m wide roads for fire and removal van access.
- It provides wider footpaths.
- It does not reduce the amount of parking spaces.

Raised crossings could be added to enhance pedestrian safety and reduce traffic speeds. See www.strathbungo.co.uk to put forward alternative suggestions to the society. The Society plans to hold a public meeting with the City Council to agree the way forward. Clearly, we need to act soon and together if we are to avoid the risk of fatal fires within our community.





CAMPHILL AVENUE RESIDENTS SHOW THE WAY

Residents of Camphill Avenue in Langside are regenerating their woodland and its historic iron fencing.

Three years ago, members of the Strathbungo Society were invited to speak to the newly-formed Camphill Avenue Residents Association (CARA) about the work to upgrade the Back Lanes and the staging of community events. Since then, CARA has held a Camphill 'Olympics' in Queens Park, a summer street party and a Winter Ceilidh.

Their most important project was to upgrade the deteriorating railings around the overgrown former pleasure gardens. Despite the area not benefiting from conservation area status, residents have been able to access over £45,000 of public funding and matched it with contributions from residents via their factors. The result? Regenerated urban woodland, a woodland walkway and the restoration of the existing, badly corroded Art Nouveau railings.

RESTORING STRATHBUNGO'S RAILINGS

The Council offers up to 50% of the capital cost to reinstate historic railings in conservation areas. Surely an opportunity exists to bring residents together reinstate historic railings. 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HEDGING, YOUR BEST

Pedestrians, particularly those with small children or prams to push, have been fighting a losing battle with the greenery shrouding Strathbungo's pavements.

Simply by taking hedges in hand, residents can increase the space available to pedestrians, improve the appearance of the neighbourhood, and grow healthier hedges.

You should trim evergreen hedges in late spring and again in late summer (though if you have a yew hedge, it only needs a summer trim). This promotes dense, bushy growth, which is essential because new shoots seldom break from older wood.

Hedge trimmers and shears are fine for more formal evergreen hedges, but they tear hedges with larger, glossy leaves, leaving the hedge looking ragged. A better choice for such hedges is to use secateurs and cut back to within the hedge canopy to disguise the cut. The same applies to holly hedges.

Deciduous hedges also require two trimmings a year, though you should do so when they are dormant and in midsummer. You can use trimmers or shears on this type of hedge.

If you have a hedge that you wish to renovate, do so over two years. The first year, cut one side back almost to the main stem and trim the other side as normal. This will promote strong growth on the side you cut back hard, while not taxing the plant too much. The next year, cut back the other side hard, while trimming the new growth on the opposite side as normal.

Hedges of all types benefit from an annual feed and mulch in the spring. This promotes strong, even growth.

BIN AND GONE?

Midge-raking, the opening of bin bags put out for collections, is experiencing a revival in Strathbungo.

This activity is not just a nuisance, causing littler to spread, but can lead to problems with identity theft and fraud. Here's what you can do to help:

Be careful what you throw out. Anything with your name and address or other personal details should be burnt or shredded

Recycle where possible. The council's big green recycling bins take glass; the blue recycling bins take high-quality plastics, tins and paper.

If you produce an unusual amount of rubbish (but that's not too bulky), you can arrange for a special one-off collection by calling the depot on 429 4532.

Any bulky items should be left outside the front of your property before 11 am on Tuesday. Try not to put items out too far in advance as neatly arranged piles do tend to be disturbed. If your items are not collected, call 287 9700

If you want to get your bin back, make sure it has the number painted on it and your lane gate also bears the total number of bins that belong there.
