

But technically we only have 75 Friends - that is, people who've pledged just £1 a week to help fund the Society. CHARRETTE LOOKS AT LOCAL **DEVELOPMENT OVER NEXT 20 YEARS**

In late February Strathburgo people are invited to take part in an intensive fourday event—dubbed a 'charrette'—aimed at producing a long-term, community-based plan for east Pollokshields and surrounding areas. Nick Kempe explains.

Pollokshields Community Council, as organisers, want to work with other stakeholders to complete the East Pollokshields and Port Eglinton Planning Study, and help inform the new City Development Plan for the next two decades. The charrette mostly affects their patch, but takes in parts of Strathbungo, including Nithsdale Road/Drive/Street. And, of course, what happens on the 'other side of the tracks' affects the quality of our lives here.

As contributors, we hope to embed the Strathbungo Conservation Area Appraisal into the planning documents.

The Strathbungo Society sees this as an opportunity to progress proposals that have been circulating for some time as well as develop new ideas in cooperation with residents. (See street plan.) Issues for the charrette include environmental improvements, energy efficiency, transport, refuse/recycling, 'stalled spaces' - the list goes on.

GREAT NEWS FOR EVERYDAY CYCLISTS

As committed cyclists, a few Society Committee members have been considering ways to create a better environment for walkers and cyclists in our area. Lots of ideas are floating around: safe cycle routes to local schools, reduced speed limits, better lane provision and, especially for flat dwellers, communal bike storage.

To that end, some of us attended the inaugural meeting of the Pollokshields Community Cycling Forum which aims to encourage more people to cycle for leisure and exercise. We'll be keeping in close touch with this group so we can share any new developments that are put in place.

The Cycling Forum is being established by Pollokshields Community Council with Strathbungo Society support. It's an excellent opportunity to push for greater cycling infrastructure.

If you drive only now and then, Co-Wheels Car Club is right up you street - almost literally. This little number is based in Queens Drive at Pollokshaws Road, opposite Mulberry Street.



Co-Wheels is a cheap, environmentally-sound alternative to car ownership. Book online and use smartcard entryno need to collect keys. Rentals start at £4.50 an hour for as many or few hours as you wish. Most cars are hybrids or electric.

Co-Wheels is a UK-wide not-for-profit social enterprise, with the blessings of Glasgow City Council, Sustainable Glasgow and Scottish Enterprise. We reckon it's okay by the Strathburgo Society too.

WHEN THE REAL 'Q' SET 007 RIGHT

Imagine the curtains twitching back in 1956 when the CID called at 17 Regent Park Square.



They wanted to question the licence-holder of a pistol similar to the gun used by one of Scotland's most notorious serial killers. Geoffrey Boothroyd, a young technical rep at ICI, told them that his gun was actually down south being illustrated for the cover of Ian Fleming's next James Bond novel.

That old excuse ...

And it was true. Boothroyd, a gun collector, had written to Fleming earlier that year to say that Bond's .25 Beretta was 'really a lady's gun'. He suggested instead a manly Smith & Wesson .38. Little did he know that it was also the weapon of choice for one Peter Manual, then on a murderous spree that would claim seven lives, the last three in Burnside.

The detectives eventually got their man and Manuel got justice at the end of a rope. Boothroyd and Fleming continued their friendly correspondence. In his next novel, Fleming introduced 'Major Boothroyd'– later known as Q - who confiscated 007's Beretta for a 'proper gun' – the very .38 that appeared on the original cover of From Russia with Love.

Boothroyd himself became firearms consultant for Dr No, the

first Bond movie, and also advised on such matters as how to set an ocean on fire – no doubt his work at ICI came in handy.

He was quite an eccentric who once told Fleming: 'I cherish a dream that one day a large tiger or lion will escape from the zoo or a travelling circus and I can bag it in Argyll Street.' That never happened, but he went on to become the world's leading authority on shotguns.

WHO LIVED IN YOUR HOUSE?

David Cook, who pointed us toward this story, found a wonderful gift when he moved into his house in Moray Place – a complete set of title deeds dating back to the original owners in 1859. It reminds you, he says, that we are only caretakers-so many people have walked up our steps, looked out our windows and raised their families here.

Alexander 'Greek' Thomson lived at 1 Moray Place and Charles Rennie Mackintosh stayed in digs in Regent Park Square. A Victorian journalist, living in Queen Square, scandalised local folk with thinly-veiled tales of Strathbungo.

These are all on-going items - look for updates on the Bungo Blog and Facebook.

- Network Rail is quiet, not always good news. Waiting for them to meet at City Chambers with the Society and Cllrs Meikle & MacLeod about 'vegetation maintenance' and fencing. Chris Jay's (11 Moray Place) letter in Herald questions clearing railway embankments whilst flooding rages. Moray Place owners checking title deeds re ownership and NR's siting of fences.
- Bus to Busy Lizzie! Half-hourly service from Darnley Rd at Sainsbury's to & from the new Queen Elizabeth University Hospital.
- Sammy Dow's reincarnation. Leaseholders met with Strathbungo Society and adjacent property owners to discuss key issues in current and proposed applications. Hopeful agreement to share applications with the Society prior to submission to avoid further confrontation.
- Strathbungo & Shawlands Community Council, the statutory consultee for planning applications, now has a permanent rep from the Society.
- Kitchen waste recycling is coming soon with free caddies & compostable liners.
